Challenges of Remote Survey and Inspection of Ships in Covid -19 Situation! Mr. Ajoy Chatterjee, Former Chief Surveyor with the Government of India; IMO Consultant and Lead IMSAS Auditor and Director Academics, ADU Academy

In this year - 2020 the coronavirus pandemic has placed the entire world in an unprecedented situation. In order to slow the spread of the disease and mitigate its impacts, travel have been curtailed and several borders are closed. Transport hubs for ships and airlines are affected. In many ports ships are Without denied entry. smooth movement of ships worldwide, the economy and well- being of our planet will surely collapse. It is, therefore, crucially important that the flow of commerce by sea should not be unnecessarily disrupted. At the same time, the safety of ships and life at sea and protection of the marine environment must also remain paramount. It is necessary to adopt a practical and pragmatic approach, in these unusual times, from issues like crew changes, ship repairs survey and certification and continued licensing of seafarers.

In these unprecedented times of global shutdown, the shipping industry has been forced to move rapidly

into the digital age so that statutory surveys, inspection and certification of ships is not delayed due to inability the surveyors to visit the vessels. This has forced flag states and Recognized Organizations (ROs) to develop their own procedures for remote surveys/ inspections.

The shipping industry is often seen as averse to change and reluctant to move into the future! However, COVID-19 has shown what can be done with today's technology we already have available to us and it is imperative that the momentum is not

Although remote inspection of ships has been in vogue for a while, automatic defect detection augmented inspections will use new technologies, such as data science and Artificial Intelligence (AI) models using pattern-recognition software, to detect structural defects in advance and assess their severity. Data collected over time from ships or offshore units can be integrated into the 3D digital twin developed during newbuilding phase. This enables ship owners and managers to better monitor and maintain their assets throughout the operational lifecycle. By using remote and augmented survey technologies like drones, ROVs and crawlers, surveyors can safely conduct onboard surveys, allowing owners to optimize the inspection process.

Once the remote survey has been conducted, and surveyors have evaluated a ship's compliance, an electronically signed e-certificate can be issued when applicable. This ensures an entirely digital experience from end to end.

Maintaining confidence credibility of remote surveys is where the challenge really lies. For many surveyors, the survey/inspection starts before they have even stepped foot on the vessel. Walking along the dock and looking at the hull, the state of the gangway, the

demeanor of the crew and countless other factors can give the surveyor a 'feel' for the ship before the true survey or inspection begins. Even crew on the best-run ships can feel nervous before and during a survey/inspection or safety audit. With remote surveys you do not

even have to try and hide these things: the crew are in complete control of what the surveyor can see. This possibility of problems being missed is sure to be the key argument from those who are against the shift to remote surveys.

All stakeholders in the industry need to be confident that remote surveys are not simply a 'soft' approach and that their credibility is guaranteed. This standardized approach ultimately

guidelines on how surveys should be performed; any update regarding surveys will need collaboration between flag states and ROs along with stakeholders.
