

A new blue print for the port sector planned keeping in view reduction in traffic following Covid 19

he Shipping Ministry has started the work related to drafting a new blueprint for India's maritime sector for the next decade. This means the goals set by the Sagar Mala program will be sufficiently lowered taking into consideration the global recession gripping the shipping industry.

The situation has got further complicated by the World wide lock down due to the spread of corona virus pandemic.

coronavirus pandemic decimated the previously laid down assumptions

coronavirus pandemic decimated the previously laid down assumptions and projections on trade that formed the basis for Sagar Mala, the flagship maritime program devised by former shipping Minister Nitin Gadkari.

Government is toying with the idea of hiring the Boston Consulting Group (BCG) as a strategic consultant to help draft the 'Maritime Vision 2030. The original Sagar mala with ambitious targets was formulated by another Mckinsey and company a few years ago.

It proposed the setting up of six new greenfield ports out of which the union cabinet gave in principle approval for setting up an international transshipment terminal at Colachel at the Southern tip of the country. The approval was given way back in 2016 but the project is yet to see the light of the day.

An ambitious outer harbor project was sanctioned for the Tuticorin port in the first union budget of the Narendra Modi government in 2014. But the project got shelved. None of the new ports conceived under the Sagar Mala project have taken
